Moore, RCL Post 144 Pinellas County, RCNA, RCAFA 447 Wing, dedicated committee members and many Veterans Organizations.

We also presented over 260 Ambassador for Peace Medals to Korean War Veterans in Canada and the U.S. working with Korean Consulate offices and Embassies.

It is our honour to nominate 10 distinguished Veterans for the UPF (Universal Peace Federation, UN's NGO) Ambassador for Peace Appreciation Medal for their contribution for Canada, Korea, UN Peace Keeping Mission and Community. 26,791 Canadians served during the Korean War (June 25, 1950 - July 27, 1953) and an additional 7,000 served during the UN Peace Keeping Mission.

We will remember our heroes, the brave 516 fallen Canadians who helped to save many innocent lives including my parents.



My family and I survived the Korean War. This would not be possible if Canada and the United Nations did not answer the call to defend Korea's democracy and her freedom.

As a boy I witnessed soldiers marching in the streets of Incheon. Tanks and jeeps rode through while bombs dropped on my hometown. We dug trenches to support the United Nations servicemen and women so that we could get rations for a meal.

516 Canadians paid the ultimate sacrifice. Today, because of this sacrifice I have the honour and a privilege of being the very first Korean born Minister in Ontario's history.

My experience stays with me each and every day.

I have returned to South Korea many times to visit friends, family and walk where I grew up. I am amazed at how Korea has come to be a global leader. Korea rose from ash to become the country it is today only because of you and your brothers and sisters in arms.

Those brave men and women said yes to democracy, yes to preserving peace and yes to the Korean people are the reason I am here to be able to honour you today.

On behalf of everyone who experienced that terrible war, their families and all those who served, I am forever grateful and will never be able to thank you enough.

100th Anniversary of the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF)



RCAF Contribution in the Korean War

- Canadian airmen flew more than 2,200 combat missions and more than 1,500 round-trip airlift flights during the Korean War.
- 1,000 Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) and other Canadian aviators, contributed to the action.
- About 800 RCAF personnel were from 426 (Transport) Squadron.
- 426 Squadron made 599 round-trip flights between McChord Air Force Base (AFB), near Tacoma, Washington, and Haneda airfield in Tokyo while working with the USAF's Material Air Transport Service.
- 22 Fighter pilots flew exclusively with the USAF's 4th Fighter Interceptor Wing (March 1952 until November 1953).
- The RCAF accounted for nearly 900 combat missions with nine MiG "kills", two "probables", and 10 "damaged".
- RCAF nurses were involved in about 250 medical evacuation flights in the Pacific and many more throughout Canada.
- Hundreds of de Havilland Canada DHC-2 Beavers in service with the US Army (known there as the L-20).
- 60 Canadair F-86 Mk II Sabre aircraft supplied to the USAF.



- "Operation Hawk", (July 25 1950 to May 25 1954) to the Canadian military portion of the Korean War airlift.
- The 426 Transport Squadron flew 12 Canadair C-54GM North Stars on 599 round trips (34,000 Flight hours) over the north Pacific, transporting 13,000 personnel and three million kilograms of freight and mail to Japan. There, cargo was offloaded for onward transit to Korea.
- RCAF Squadron Leader Andy MacKenzie was the only Canadian airman who became a Prisoner of War (POW) during the Korean War.
- The last official Canadian casualty of the Korean War, Major Edward Gower, was on his return flight from Korea to Calgary in December 1956 when his TCA North Star hit Mount Slesse (near Hope, British Columbia). The wreckage was found in May 1957 and the remains of all 62 crew and passengers rest on the mountain to this day.
- Canadians received 57 Commonwealth and US awards, medals, and commendations.
- RCAF pilots received eight U.S. Distinguished Flying Crosses and 10 U.S. Air Medals. Flight Lieutenant Ernest Glover was the last and only RCAF pilot to be awarded the Commonwealth Distinguished Service Cross since the Second World War.



- Flight Lieutenant Omer Lévesque, (who was already serving on exchange with the Americans when the war broke out) volunteered to fly F-86 Sabres with the United States Air Force. On December 17, Flight Lieutenant Lévesque took flight with the squadron's first operational sortie, taking on Soviet MiG-15s. He thus became the first Canadian and the first Commonwealth pilot to engage in jet-to-jet combat. He was also the first RCAF member to score a victory during the Korean War. Lévesque earned the U.S. Air Medal by flying 20 missions from December 17 to 20. On March 30, 1951, while flying as part of an escort of B-29 bombers, he earned the American Distinguished Flying Cross for his dogfight with several MiGs. The aircraft he shot down during War earned him the title "ace" (five aircraft).
- Captain Patrick (served during WWII and Communication Expert) flew on six B-29 bombing missions and acted as the radar officer to analyze enemy radar and the available counter-measures equipment.
- High scoring pilots included Flight Lieutenant (F/L) Ernie Glover with three kills and three damaged, and Squadron Leader (S/L) Doug Lindsay with two kills and three damaged.
- RCAF flight nurses were trained at Gunter Air Force Base in Alabama and then participated in three month tours of duty carrying out medical evacuations (medevacs) from the South Pacific. 40 Canadian flight nurses were involved in nearly 250 medical evacuation flights from 1950 to 1955, bringing the wounded and injured from Tokyo through Honolulu and back to North America.

The Sabre entered RCAF service in the spring of 1951 and equipped nine squadrons serving in both Canada and Europe. 350 Mk. 2s were delivered to the RCAF during 1951-2 (during the Korean War). The RAF ordered 370 Sabres from Canadair in 1951 and, as the RCAF required additional fighters, an improved version (Mk. 4) came into production. Eventually 438 Mk. 4 Sabres were built. Most Canadair Sabre Mk. 2s and Mk. 4s served with the 2nd Tactical Air Force in Europe.





Claude LaFrance enrolled in the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) in 1947 and, after receiving his wings in 1948 at Centralia, Ontario, flew the DH-100 Vampire - Canada's first jet fighter. When the Korean War broke out, he was instructing on that aircraft at the fighter school in Chatham, New Brunswick.

The Americans were flying F-86 Sabres in Korea and the school switched to the Sabre in early 1952. So the young instructor was seconded to the U.S. Air Force to gain combat experience.


"At that time, the Sabre was the only aircraft that had a chance against the Russian MiGs," LaFrance said.

May 1952, F/L Claude LaFrance was in Korea, flying as a wingman with 39 Fighter Interceptor Squadron in a Canadian-built Sabre. By the time he returned to Canada in October 1952, he had flown 50 missions, been promoted from flying officer to flight lieutenant, commanded a patrol of four aircraft and later a flight of 16 aircraft, and had shot down a MiG-15 (the pilot bailed out).

The Americans awarded him the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal for that success and for his leadership during his tour.

He served for 34 years with RCAF and retried as a Major-General.





Thomas George Prince MM and Silver Star (October 25, 1915 - November 25, 1977) was an Indigenous Canadian war hero and Canada's most decorated First Nations soldier, serving in World War II and the Korean War.

He served with the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry 2nd Battalion (2PPCLI) at the battle of Kapyong during the Korean War. The 2PPCLI received the "United States Presidential Unit Citation". We Will Remember Him.



Romeo Daley is a Métis Veteran and a proud Veteran of Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI) who served during the Korean War. He served as the President of the Korea Veterans Association Unit 15 Niagara, as well as being the Sergeant-at-Arms for the PPCLI Association of Canada. Every year he visits schools in his area to teach students about the Korean War and Canada's numerous peacekeeping missions.

He was part of the executive of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 71 in Fort Erie for many years, where he helped organize commemorative events and Korea Veterans Association appreciation luncheons in Niagara Falls, He was the keynote speaker for the Korean War Photo Exhibition in Toronto, was a guest speaker at the Canadian Parachute Association and has been interviewed by the Korean media as part of the Memory Project and the Veteran Story series.

Romeo Daley has spread the word about Canadian troops and their efforts in the Korean War and overseas service. He reminds people that the liberties, rights and privileges we all enjoy are the result of the selfless actions of those who fought and died for Canada and her allies. He shares this message of remembrance to ensure that current and future generations will never forget.

He stated that the Korean War is not <u>"A Forgotten War, It is a Forgotten Victory"</u> in his recent interview with The TVO "The Agenda with Steve Paikin"

Hon. Yonah Martin, Senator



Born in Seoul, South Korea, Yonah Martin (Kim) immigrated to Canada in 1972. Since 2009, following an exemplary teaching career and extensive community activism, Senator Yonah Martin representing British Columbia, became the first Canadian of Korean descent to serve in the Senate of Canada, and the first Korean-Canadian parliamentarian in Canadian history. Senator Martin has been honoured many times by both the Canadian & Korean Governments for her outstanding work for Community and Korean War Veterans.

The Honourable Senator Yonah Martin introduced and helped to pass Bill S-213 recognizing July 27 as "Korean War Veterans Day" in 2013 to honour the Korean War Veterans and their legacy. She also initiated the "Canada-Korea free Trade Agreement" (\$11 Billion) to strengthen a diplomatic relations between Canada and Korea in 2014. Recently, Senator Yonah Martin recognized the month of October as the "Korean Heritage Month" in the Senate of Canada to celebrate 5,000 years of rich history, culture (including K-Pop, K- Food, K-Drama), tradition of Korea and contribution of Korean War Veterans and Korean-Canadian community.

It was our pleasure to be invited to witness the signing of the CK-Free Trade Agreement at he Parliament Hill on September 22, 2014 by the Prime Minister's Office and to witness the Korean flag raising ceremony at the Parliament hill by Senator Yonah Martin on October 7, 2024.
